3 Best Practices To Create A Foster Friendly Faith Community

One of the ways America's Kids Belong works to dramatically improve the experiences and outcomes for kids in foster care is by ensuring that foster families are seen and valued in their communities as they need to stand in the gap with vulnerable children.

By implementing just two of the following three best practices, your faith community will become Foster Friendly and help recruit and retain more foster parents.



TRAUMA AWARE

Ensure that your staff and volunteers serving children and youth are trauma aware.

We offer a free one-hour awareness training as well as a 6.5 hour trauma-informed training for faith leaders, as well as recommendations of other qualified trauma resources.



SUPPORT MINISTRY

Identify and engage with the kinship and foster families in your community. And then hear what their needs are and launch an ongoing ministry to support them.

We have guides and free resources to help you survey your foster families and start programs including foster family support groups, foster parents' night out and WRAP programs.



TEACH

Teach in a main gathering annually about the importance of caring for vulnerable children and families and give people an opportunity to respond.

We offer a sermon outline and a resource guide to help you get started.

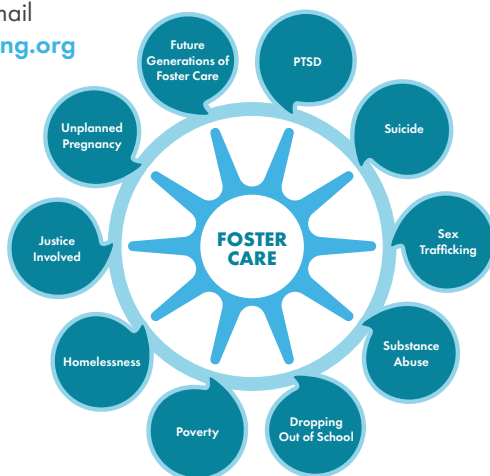
More Ways To Help [State] Kids In Foster Care
