For many, the term foster care carries negative connotations, harsh stereotypes and many unknowns. It is often the fear of what is unknown that keeps people from engaging.



9,000 KIDS

There are nearly **9,000 kids**in foster care in TN,
including teens, siblings &
those with medical needs



4,500 HOMES

There are approximately **4,500 foster homes** ready and able to serve the most vulnerable kids in our state



BURNOUT

Half of all foster parents close their homes after just one year citing "isolation" and a "lack of social support"

RISKS OF AGING OUT OF FOSTER CARE

Children who age out of foster care without a family are far more at risk to experience the following:



- TRAUMA
 - 1 in 4 experience PTSD, higher than war veterans
- SUICIDE

Attempts are 4x more likely than peers

SEX TRAFFICKING

50% to 90% of victims were in foster care

DROP OUT OF SCHOOL

Less than half graduate high school

ADDICTION

1/3 admit to a problem; 1/2 admit to use of drugs

· INCARCERATION

By 23, nearly 1/2 of males spent time behind bars

UNPLANNED PREGNANCY

3x more likely to be pregnant by 19

- LOSE KIDS TO SYSTEM
 #1 risk factor is mom's welfare history

· POVERTY

1/3 live at or below the poverty line

HOMELESSNESS

1/2 become homeless within a year

While children enter foster care for a variety of reasons, it is never through a fault of their own. Kids in foster care need a safe, loving network of adults rooting for their success. There is an urgent need for more foster homes and community involvement to support foster parents. Faith communities are uniquely equipped to answer this call. While not everyone is able to foster, we know everyone can do something to ensure children have a place to belong.

FROM PLANNING TO EXECUTION



Next Steps Panels share accurate information and present first-hand experiences to your faith community. It is crucial to offer a safe space where interested individuals can ask questions, dispel fears and, ultimately, feel empowered to find their place supporting those in foster care.



If families in your faith community commit to the critical work of foster care, we strongly recommend building a network of support for their journey.

 ☐ How has being a foster family impacted biological children? (ask kids or parents on panel) ☐ What would you say to someone who is afraid to get "too attached" while fostering? ☐ What do you do as a couple if one person is more excited about fostering than the other? ☐ Can you foster if you're single? 		
PARENTS	seasoned and new foster, adoptive & kinship parents	
 What has been the hardest thing about fostering/adopting? The best thing? The biggest surprise? How have you built relationships with the children that have come into your home? Is there one thing you wish you would have known before getting started? What kind of support has been the most helpful to you and your family? What led you to begin exploring adoption? What types of questions did you ask different adoption agencies before deciding on one? 		
FORMER FOSTER YOUTH	former foster youth - adults or older teens	
 □ Tell us about your experience growing up in a home that fostered. How has it impacted you? □ What were some of the hard things about this experience and what were some of the good things? □ What did your parents do to explain things to you and get your perspective and input? □ Is there anything else you'd want to share about fostering teens? 		
PARTNERS	nonprofits, CASA workers, foster closets	
 □ Tell us about your organization and how you help/support kids in foster care. □ Why are volunteers critical to your work? □ Share a story about how your organization had a positive impact in the life of a child/family. □ Is there anything else you'd want to say to someone considering volunteering with your org?
